<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Distinguish the structural elements of a theatre including seating arrangements, stage arrangements, fly rails, management , and shop areas. 2. Recognize and practice safety rules in all areas. 3. Recognize and accurately use a variety of carpentry, sewing, scene painting, and lighting tools and equipment. 4. Define various theatrical titles and understand basic theatrical organization. 5. Demonstrate a variety of basic carpentry and painting techniques. 6. Utilize a variety of lighting equipment. 7. Create a basic design for a show. 	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Students are required to design a setting for a variety of theatrical architecture with different structural elements in mind. 2. Students will be instructed on basic safety protocols in each area. Correct practices will be modeled by the instructor and crew chiefs. Instructor and supervisor observation will serve as the assessment tool. 3. Students will be asked to complete a number of stagecraft projects where they will learn specific guidelines for equipment operation and tool use. Performance will be assessed through instructor observation. 4. Students are assigned to crews with specific individuals identified in supervisory positions. Students must work within their assigned areas. 5. Students will build Class projects and Set pieces for upcoming shows: performance will be assessed using a four part rubric to include: Use of materials, Functionality of project, Attention to stated specifications, Team work. 6. Students will hang, gel, and focus lights for upcoming college events. Assessment by instructor observation. 7. Assessed via a four part rubric to include: Communication of production concept, Use of materials, Fidelity to production concept, and Aesthetic impact.
